Growing out of the interactive read-aloud experience and linked to independent reading, teachers use many of these texts as examples from which they generalize the understanding. Who is it for?

As a whole-group instructional context, reading minilessons are concise, explicit lessons with a purposeful application in building your students' independent reading competencies. Each minilesson engages students in inquiry that leads to the discovery and understanding of a general principle they can apply to their own reading or writing about reading.

If there are five guided reading ability groups in the classroom, the teacher can expect to read with each group approximately every other day, for a minimum of twice per week. This is usually done on a rota basis. While the teacher reads with a group, the other groups can be engaged in other reading activities suitable for their level.

How to Teach Guided Reading

Reading Workshop is a powerful way to structure your reading class. Using this model involves guiding your students to choose their own books as well as providing significant amounts of time for them to read independently. By allowing your students to choose their own books, you can foster a love of reading that will last a lifetime.

Reading Workshop Strategies

In last week's post, I described what reading workshop is and how it can be modified to work in primary classrooms.Today I'm going to go more in-depth on an essential component of reading workshop: the minilesson. In today's post, I'll discuss the structure of a minilesson and how to figure out what to teach in your minilessons (in the context of reading workshop).

What Is a Reading Workshop Minilesson?

Guided Reading Mini-Lesson {Storage & Organization}

A mini-lesson at the beginning of Independent Reading is "a time to learn something specific about reading." Morgan et al., p. 17. This short (5-15 minute) dose of explicit instruction helps children practice applying appropriate strategies to books they enjoy when they go off to read.

Mini-Lessons | Reading Recovery

The lesson sequence for Reading Workshop is as follows: Mini-Lesson: 5-15 minutes depending on the lesson, some may run longer, some shorter- it depends on the lesson and the time of the year. Independent Reading: T he bulk of your time is spent here, 30 minutes, but shorter in the beginning of the year. Share Time: 5-10 minutes.

How to Do Reading Workshop

One guided reading lesson at the fifth grade level takes place over the course of two days. Phase one involves introducing the text, previewing unfamiliar language structures, vocabulary, and features, and assigning a teaching point to work on.

Depending on the mini-lesson, they are also applying or practicing what they have learned to their independent reading or reading center work. For example, on Day 6 the students learn about the importance of asking questions before, during, and after reading. While they are independently reading, they will be practicing this reading skill.

First 20 Days of Reading Workshop in 5th Grade

Mini Lesson with a Mentor Text I start each reading block with a mini lesson via some type of read aloud. I begin the lesson with an anchor chart that lists our reading skill or strategy for the day. It may say something like: Good readers identify a character's traits using details from the text so they can fully understand the character.
